SUBJECT: May 2007 EPSB Update

Mission Statement

The Education Professional Standards Board promotes high levels of student achievement by establishing and enforcing rigorous professional standards for preparation, certification, and responsible and ethical behavior of all professional educators in Kentucky.

FYI: Interdisciplinary Early Childhood Education (IECE) Teachers

With the national and statewide attention on Pre-K instruction, I thought you might be interested in the number of IECE teachers we are producing. In the 2006-07 school year, we issued 30 emergency IECE certificates, down from 38 the year before. This school year we have a total of 793 IECE teachers teaching in Kentucky schools.

May Sunday Evening Study Session

Prior to our May 14 meeting, we will have a Sunday evening study session. The session will convene at 4:00 p.m. (EDT) and will focus on the 2008-10 biennium budget request. As you know, we will be making our formal biennium budget request this fall, and the development of the budget is a long and fairly complicated process. Gary

Freeland will guide us through the steps of the process and collect your ideas on what we need to include in the request.

The second part of the study session will be a final review of the 2007 legislative session. Alicia and Marcie will provide us an overview of the bills that passed as well as those that did not but which we expect to see again. Alicia will also guide us through the initial steps in the development of the EPSB legislative agenda for the 2008 General Assembly.

Spring Presentations by EPSB Staff

- On April 17 I presented the redesign of the master's and principal preparation programs to the **Appalachian P-16 Council** at Morehead State University. Following the presentation, I engaged in an open conversation with MoSU education faculty regarding the redesign efforts.
- On April 18 I joined Dr. Frank Cheatham at **Campbellsville University** for the dedication of Campbellsville's new chapel. Afterwards I met with education faculty and several members of the arts and science faculty.
- EPSB had a team of presenters at the **KACTE Spring Conference** on April 19. Mike Carr, Cindy Owen, Gary Stephens, and Melissa Miracle updated the group on a variety of topics, including the new initiatives surrounding master's programs and the ELR Task Force; the new Option 6 regulation; issues surrounding KTIP, KPIP, and assessments; clarification of institutional reporting of alternative certification candidates via the Title II report; and issues surrounding educator disciplinary cases. Terry Hibpshman presented on Perspectives on Educator Preparation Program Assessment.
- I have been asked to help lead discussion in a breakout group during **SREB's annual Leadership Forum**. The discussion will focus on the progress states have made in the systematic reform of education leadership. As you know, we have benefited greatly from having Kathy O'Neill from SREB serve as our consultant to the ELR Task Force – I am glad to be able to give back.
- Marilyn Troupe has been asked to participate in a panel discussion titled "Building State Capacity for Performance Assessment in Teacher Education." The panel will be conducted during the annual **NCATE clinic** this month. Marilyn will make a presentation and then lead a discussion.
- Mike Carr and Cindy Godsey met with a group of about 60 district human resources and financial services representatives on Friday, April 20, in conjunction with the spring conference of the **Kentucky Education Executive Information System (KEEIS) Consortium**. This group works with a software vendor in the state to create more user-friendly software, enabling districts to more easily utilize data from the MUNIS finance and personnel

system. At this meeting EPSB staff presented new and improved applications regarding districts' access of educator certificate information via our KECI system. These applications will allow districts access to accurate data regarding certification expirations and the many certificate codes which have been used over the years.

Redesign of Master's Programs Used for Rank Change

We are vetting the current Kentucky Teacher Standards and the redesign guidelines with many different groups around the state. So far we have received very positive responses, and I look forward to our moving this effort forward as part of the May agenda.

Education Leader Redesign Task Force Update

The four workgroups have submitted their draft reports. We have a team of writers charged with pulling these different drafts into one. I plan to have this report before you at the regular EPSB meeting in June.

EPSB Technology Partnerships Recognized

The Commonwealth Office of Technology (COT) presented the Second Annual "Best of Kentucky" Awards at the Kentucky Digital Summit, April 23-24, at the Embassy Suites in Lexington. The summit, co-sponsored each year by the COT and Government Technology Magazine, recognizes outstanding individuals and programs that have made information technology contributions to the public sector. Each of the following peer-nominated award winners was picked from over 50 nominees.

The EPSB shared in two awards, **Best IT Collaboration Among Organizations** and **Best Application Serving the Public**. This accomplishment is the result of a Board who has provided the vision and leadership staff who have provided the guidance, but special thanks go to Scott Smith, who leads our technology branch, and Chela Kaplan, who manages KyEducators.org. I am especially proud of the collaboration and partnerships that have evolved and now position us to provide even better services to Kentucky's educators. Well done, everyone.

Teacher Working Conditions Survey

On April 19 EPSB staff presented to the Educational Leadership Development Collaborative a proposal for creating a teacher working conditions survey. The presentation was similar to that given to board members at our Winter Retreat. Mike Carr served on a panel with Mary Ann Blankenship and Michael Kral of KEA, David Baird of KSBA, and Carolyn Witt Jones of the Partnership for Successful Schools. The presentation marks the beginning of our efforts to gain support for the administration of such a survey and to solicit input for the implementation of such an effort. Plans are being made with this group to convene a meeting of the various stakeholder education groups to move forward with the survey project.

Update on EPSB Technology

KECI (Kentucky Educator Certification Inquiry) Enhancements

For some time local school districts have had the capability of viewing and printing a list of their teachers with expired certifications. We have now given districts the ability to download this information into a spreadsheet.

We have also provided the school districts with an additional feature—access to view, download, and print a list of their teachers with active certifications. They may use the downloaded file to electronically update their MUNIS systems. This replacement of the manual process will save hours required for typing in the data and possibly reduce keying errors.

NASDTEC Automation

Another manual process that has been automated is the acquisition of NASDTEC Clearinghouse data. These data are now retrieved by the EPSB automatically on a daily basis, more quickly providing the Divisions of Certification and Legal Services with information needed during the processing of applications.

Code of Ethics Brochure

I have contacted all district superintendents and offered again this year to provide the EPSB Code of Ethics brochures. Last year we distributed almost 45,000 copies to local school districts and teacher preparation programs.
